Thus began a new friendship and a new annual tradition, which Hinton documents online. "Family is more than blood," says Dench. "It's the people you want to be with."

This year's meal will be bittersweet, with an empty chair for Dench's husband, who died of Covid-19 in April. To show support after that loss, Hinton sent his "grandma" a collection of loving video messages. Strangers worldwide expressed condolences to a woman who'd fully embraced a stranger.

It is about letting go of our worries and pain, our anxieties and turning them over to God. I can't help but hear those words from the Psalmist when he writes: THE LORD IS MY SHEPHERD, I SHALT NOT WANT. HE MAKES ME TO LIE DOWN IN GREEN PASTURES, he restores my soul....It is amazing how God will welcome us and will open His loving arms to our needs and fears.

I want to thank all of my wonderful church family for being there for me during this very scary and stressful time. For those who don't know, I experienced a heart attack at home; but for the grace of our loving God, my oldest son and his wife (a nurse) were there. Lora took my pulse which was fine, my



oxygen level was fine, but my blood pressure was 260/128 and my chest hurt so bad I couldn't breathe. She didn't want to scare me so she just looked at my son and said take her to the hospital NOW! After three rounds of nitro it started to come down, but they couldn't get my pressure regulated. I was not a good candidate for bypass because of my height and because of my mom's history of having a massive stroke due to plaque, so now I have 3 stents. They think they can control the other 3 with medication. With Covid-19, and no visitors, it was easier to keep everyone informed on line. Thank you all for your prayers, cards and calls! I hope I didn't drive you all crazy with texting on Facebook. I was so scared because they couldn't make up their minds which was the best and safest approach. Every time they got another test back it would affect their decision. I put myself in God's loving hands and had wonderful nurses that would pray with me; as well as all of you. I love you all!! Note: If your doctor keeps telling you that your chest pain is just acid reflux (for a year), but you have the pain everyday, and you can't climb more than 6 steps without being out of breath, go to the hospital! - Sandy Kidd

OCTOBER SESSION NEWS

- [1] At the October Session meeting a vote was taken again as to whether we should open for "in person worship service" and the vote was unanimous that we hold off for another month.
- [2] The nominating committee reported the names of those who are willing to serve the Lord as an elected member of the Session for the class of 2023. Those willing to serve are: Ralph Gillespie to serve a second 3 year term; George Hove to serve a three year term as Elder; Pete Wells to complete a three year term vacated by Gale Newman. Also Sarah Kelly and Loweta Rogers have agreed to serve as Deacons for a three year term. These nominations were presented to the Session at the October meeting and approved.
- [3] A letter will be sent out within the next week to ALL members of the congregation for the purpose of electing new elders and deacons. You will be asked to return the letter with your vote and signature. This will serve as an official election so we do not have to meet in person for a congregational vote.
- [4] We are still in need of someone who is willing to serve as Clerk of the Session. It was suggested by Leslie Belden, Clerk of the Arkansas Presbytery that two people could serve in that capacity, sharing the different responsibilities.
- [5] The results of the congregational vote to reduce the number of session members from nine to seven were unanimous. Beginning 2021 we will have a seven member session.
- [6] The results of the issue of whether members would participate in "in-person" worship was 23 votes for and 23 votes against.

The Lowdown on the Great Autumn Gourd

Corn might be the king of the U.S. crops, but pumpkins are always in demand this time of year by kids and others celebrating fall's festivities. Here are several interesting tidbits about one of America's favorite fall gourds.

Germany boasts the world's largest pumpkin! The world's largest pumpkin was presented in 2016 at the Giant Pumpkin European Championship, officially weighing in at a stout 2,624.6 pounds. Steve Geddes of New Hampshire is the owner of the largest U.S. pumpkin, weighing 2,528 pounds at the 2018 Deerfield Fair.

Illinois is the U.S. pumpkin leader. Pumpkins are grown in all 50 states, but Illinois is by far the leader with about 600 million pounds of pumpkins harvested each year.

Pumpkin beer has plenty of fanfare. Pumpkin beer was actually a thing hundreds of years ago when the Pilgrims arrived in America as pumpkins were plentiful and provided an easy source of fermentable sugar. Who knew??

Pumpkin carving started with the Irish. Jack-o'-lanterns were first carved by the Irish and Scottish using turnips and potatoes. They used the carved vegetables as part of their Celtic celebrations. Immigrants brought their carving traditions to America, but found that pumpkins were an easier vegetable to carve.

There are more than 40 varieties of pumpkins. Two of the best pumpkins to use for cooking are the Cinderella and the Fair Tale. Most of the pumpkins you see on roadside stands are for decoration only and not very tasty!



THANK YOU!

In the English language, it is common to hear "thank you" or "thanks" as a polite response. Whether you are planning a trip to a foreign country, have a friend who speaks another language, or are looking for a unique way to say thanks, there are many ways to express your appreciation.

The following are examples of how to say thank you in 20 languages other than English:

- •Arabic **shukran** (shoe-kran)
- •Chinese xie xie (she-eh she-eh)
- •Croatian **hvala** (HVAH-lah)
- •Danish tak (tahg)
- •Dutch dank u (dahnk oo)
- •Finnish **kiitos** (key-toss)
- •French **merci** (MEHR-see)
- •German danke (dahn-kah)
- •Greek **efharisto** (ef-hah-rees-TOH)
- •Hawaiian- **mahalo** (ma-HA-lo)
- •Indonesian terima kasih (Tur-EE-mah KAH-see)
- •Italian grazie (GRAHTS-yeh)
- •Japanese arigato (ah-ree-GAH-toh)
- •Korean kamsahamnida (KAM-sah-ham-NEE-da)
- Norwegian takk (tahk)
- Portugese obrigado (oh-bree-GAH-dooh)

In addition to speaking the words thank you, you can also sign the words in American Sign Language. To do this, start with the fingers on your prominent hand and place them near your lips. Keep your hand flat and move your hand forward and down in the direction of the person you want to thank.
