A Prayer for Lent

This year, Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, falls on March 2. During worship services that day, pastors in many Christian churches dip a finger in ashes (often made by burning branches from the previous Palm Sunday) and make a cross on parishioners' foreheads.



Why ashes? Traditionally, they're a sign of mourning, humiliation and penitence. Ashes also represent the frailty and temporary nature of human life ("You are dust, and to dust you shall return," Genesis 3:19). Christians are pained because our sins led to Jesus' death. With repentant hearts, we begin the season of Lent, knowing that it leads to Jesus' resurrection on Easter Sunday.

For Ash Wednesday — and throughout the 40 days of Lent — ponder this prayer from an Italian sacramentary, or liturgical book: "O God, you know how fragile is our human nature, wounded as it is by sin. Help your people to enter upon the Lenten journey strengthened by the power of your word, so that we may be victorious over the seduction of the Evil One and reach the paschal feast in the joy of the Holy Spirit."

This next week we begin the Lenten journey once again. On Wednesday we gather to enter into the Lenten journey as we come together in worship to celebrate Holy Communion and to be reminded once again that from dust we came and to dust we shall return as we are marked with ashes.

In the Gospel readings for this Lenten Season we focus on the following:

- *Ash Wednesday: we hear about fasting, almsgiving, prayer and our treasures
- *Lent 1: We hear of the temptation of Jesus in the wilderness
- *Lent 2: We hear how Jesus laments over Jerusalem
- *Lent 3: We hear of our need for repentance
- *Lent 4: We hear once again the story of the Prodigal Son and of the lost sheep
- *Lent 5: From the Gospel of John 12: we hear of the anointing of Jesus by Mary
- *Passion Sunday: We hear the story of Jesus' passion event, his final meal with his disciples, his judgment, sentencing to death,
- *Maundy Thursday: The washing of Jesus' feet and the New Commandment
- *Resurrection of Our Lord and Savior: The Easter Event we gather each week in worship to celebrate and to give thanks for. The journey is complete!

Join me in another journey as we as find our way through scripture taking us to the greatest event in our life in the resurrection and ascension of the Savior of the world.

I encourage you to devote time this Lenten season reflecting on the grace of God's offering up God's only Son, God's chosen one, God's beloved. What does this mean for you that our creator God would love us so much that God would allow God's Son to suffer and die for you?


